The start of the American Revolution 1775

Flight from Harpersfield by American Patriots **1777**

 In the village of Harpersfield Colonel Joseph Harper was warned by friendly Indians that they were about to be attacked the next day by an Indian war party led by Joseph Brant. Brant was the leader of the war party for the six Indian Nations. That night Colonel Harper his family and many of the supporters of the American Revolution fled to Middleburg. The next day the Indians attacked and burned the Harpersfield settlement to the ground.


Start of trail of signs for the Revolutionary war events in the town of Harpersfield N.Y.

 Start at the Harpersfield building located behind the Harpersfield Post Office. Turn onto Col,. Harper Road heading west. On the corner you will see the first sign dedicated to a war party on April 7th, 1780.



Continue to the next left on Wilcox Rd. Approx. 1 ¼ miles on Wilcox on the right side is the second sign dedicated to Cornelius Teabout.


Continue on Wilcox Road to the end. On the left side of the road is the third sign dedicated to William Stevens.


Make a sharp right hand turn onto Middlebrook Hill Road. Take the first left onto Moxham Road and follow that for approx. ¼ mile past Stevens Road and the fourth sign will be on your left.

Turn around on Moxham Rd. back to Smith Rd. on your left. Go ten feet and the Fifth Sign is on your Left, dedicated to Alexander Harper.


Continue on Smith Rd and turn Right onto Gaffey Rd. Go aprox., ½ mile and the Sixth Sign dedicated to Lt. Thomas Hendry will be on your Right.

Turn around on Gaffey Rd passing Smith Rd and continue to intersection with Peck Street. Make a Right on Peck St and go approx. 2 miles to Fisher Rd. Turn Left onto Fisher Rd. and go approx. ¼ mile on the Left is the seventh sign which is dedicated to James Hendy and his brother John.

Continue on Fisher Rd. to Oakley Rd. on the right. Take this to the intersection of Taylor Rd. Make a right onto Taylor Rd. and continue to the intersection of State Rt. 10. Turn right on Rt.10 and the 8th sign is directly in front of you on the right in front of the Stamford Veterans Club.

Continue on State Route 10 approximately 3 mile, passing through the intersection with State Route 23, to Peters Road on your Right. Turn Right onto Peters Road and go approx. 1 mile to the 9th sign on your left

Continue on Peters Rd. approx. 1 ½ miles to Odel Lake Rd. Make a Left onto Odel Lake Rd. and travel approx. 1 mile. To the next Right (it is a dead end street.) Travel ½ mile to the 10th sign on your Left.

Turn around and return to Odel Lake Road and make a Left. Take Odel Lake Rd all the way to State Route 23. Make a Left on State Route 23. Travel 2 miles to the corner of Middlebrook Hill Road where the 11 th sign is located.
